Recent Highlights from UMBC's Language, Literacy & Culture Doctoral Program Fall 2023

Dear LLC Community,

In celebration of our doctoral program's beginnings 25 years ago, we have planned a celebration on the evening of April 4th, 2024. *Please save the date!*

Our 25th year began auspiciously with our esteemed colleague, Professor **Christine Mallinson**, receiving the Lipitz Distinguished Professorship. This has allowed her to take a research leave this academic year to work on two collaborative NSF funded projects, and we look forward to her Lipitz lecture on April 18th, 2024.

As part of our 25th anniversary initiatives, we have begun a recruitment program for new students at national conferences. Our students and faculty have represented LLC at AERA and NWSA. We've also begun a minitalk series of scholars and alums to discuss their research and work. This initiative will be expanded in the spring as a way to give students an opportunity to learn about our alumni's jobs and how current students' research might fit with future research and employment.

Reading through this edition of our newsletter, I am proud of our accomplished students and affiliate faculty. LLC continues to produce excellent dissertations, including three spring/summer Ph.D. graduates and a handful more who will be awarded the Ph.D. in December. We also had three students enter candidacy by successfully defending their dissertation proposals this year, and eight bright and engaged students just began their Ph.D. journey with us this fall. We welcome Dr. **Sara Cole** as a Visiting Lecturer this year. Sara knows our program well, having received her LLC PhD in 2013 and is available to work with students individually on any bottlenecks they may be experiencing. She will be offering *Digital Media: Culture and Identity* this spring.

Dr. **Tanya Saunders** is initiating multiple projects to help our doctoral program build an extra-curricular intellectual community especially around decolonial participatory action research in Cuba and Brazil. This fall they initiated the Black in the Americas series: with the important Cuban-Haitian anti-racist activist, Roberto Zurbano Torres; with a *griot* of Black radical activism in Brazil, Diva Moreira, who spoke passionately about racism and the need for reparations in Brazil; with a visiting Maroon artist and researcher, Maya Quilolo, who held four workshops on embodied research practices and participatory action research; and with Tiely who spoke about his 30-years in hip-hop culture in Brazil and the importance of including LGBTQIAP+ artists. Building on Dr. Saunders' leadership in internationalization and decolonizing our curriculum, our students continue to work on research projects with a global focus, and even I have begun to publish in bi-lingual journals and participate in conferences in Brazil.

Dr. **Ramon Goings** continues to produce exemplary public-facing research and publications. With his guidance, LLC's **Jackie Peng** (cohort 23) won the prestigious AERA Minority Dissertation Fellowship, and he continues to revitalize our efforts at coaching our students in writing, completing, and successfully defending excellent dissertations in a timely manner. Some LLC students have published book reviews with me as a book review editor; and we hope that everyone who graduates from LLC has produced at least one publication.

Dynamic change cannot happen without expert coordination and programmatic stability. The combination of that foundation with the exciting intellectual community my colleagues are building this year fills me with hope for the start of LLC's next quarter century.


